Joyce Smith (<u>00:20</u>):

I came from Trinidad and Tobago. I ended up in Baltimore, Maryland, and this is where I've been since. Seven days a week for 30 years now. I get so much love from the customers in here it's better than where I came from. They had no love in them.

My name is Jamilia, and my relation to Joyce is, she's my mother. Just watching a black woman come up, handling everything merely on her own. I guess it was just embedded in me.

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Joyce, what do you think? What do you hope your daughter has learned from watching you and learning from you and the way you've lived your life?

Joyce Smith (<u>01:44</u>):

That she could be just like me. Don't depend on nobody for nothing. Get up and get your own. You know? Hey, come say something about Soul Sauce, we're going on the radio.

Joyce is a nice person, but she get nasty sometimes. Don't make her mad. Don't make her mad. You make her mad, I don't know. She go crazy on you.
