For two months they help us with the rent and everything. After that, we just got it by ourself, we started just working. Thank you. Hi, cutie. Who is that? You have a baby, no?

No, you don't have a baby. I thought you got a baby.

Tell me how you decided to name this place, Mama's Grocery?

Rishan:

My daughter, the little one. "Who going to work there?," She said my daughter. Me, I told her let's call Mama, that's it we call it. And everybody, they call me Mama. Nobody knows my name but I'm okay with that.
