We Muslims. We have a greeting, it's called as-salamu alaykum. I like it a lot because before you even shake the person's hand you invite peace to you and that person, and we should all be about peace. I like to read a lot, study a lot. My Islamic studies take a lot of time, and [inaudible 00:01:32] we pray five times a day, so that takes a long time out of the day. But other than that, I try to have a new experience each day. A lot of people feel like... The one gentleman was talking to me before, he's like, "Well, why all do you Muslims come over here? Why are you guys building mosque over here?" I said, "Well, everyone does that. I've seen Buddhist church, Christian churches, Jewish churches. We just want our voice to be heard too. And discrimination is everywhere, brother. That was my problem too." I said, "Man, these people over here, crazy. Crazy, yelling all the time." I live over here too. So it's never quiet. But after a year or two living here, I realized that everybody's got good, and everybody's got bad. And if we all come to a better understanding of what people go through, we might take away some of our ignorance.
