#### Donovan Upchurch (00:00):

Donovan Upchurch, Ajna Print & Design, 2431 Saint Paul. Rotate the screen around to the one you're trying to use. Flood the ink over the screen, which is basically covering the image, and then you push. This is where my six color, six table silk screen press is. It's basically sitting on a four legged stand and has a big swinging wheel that has six pallets attached to that wheel and a separate wheel that sits above that in a horizontal position.

### Donovan Upchurch (00:30):

And that has the heads attached to it, which are on springs where you pull them down and they lock into place. And then you lay the ink through the screen onto the shirt. This is a vinyl printer cutter. It's about 10 feet wide in total almost, but it prints five and a half feet, or four and a half feet media by as long as it needs to feed.
